(1815-1888)

John Bosco was born on 16th August 1815, in a peasant family at Becchi, near the city of Turin, Italy. He was only two years old when his father, Francis Bosco passed away.



The Dream

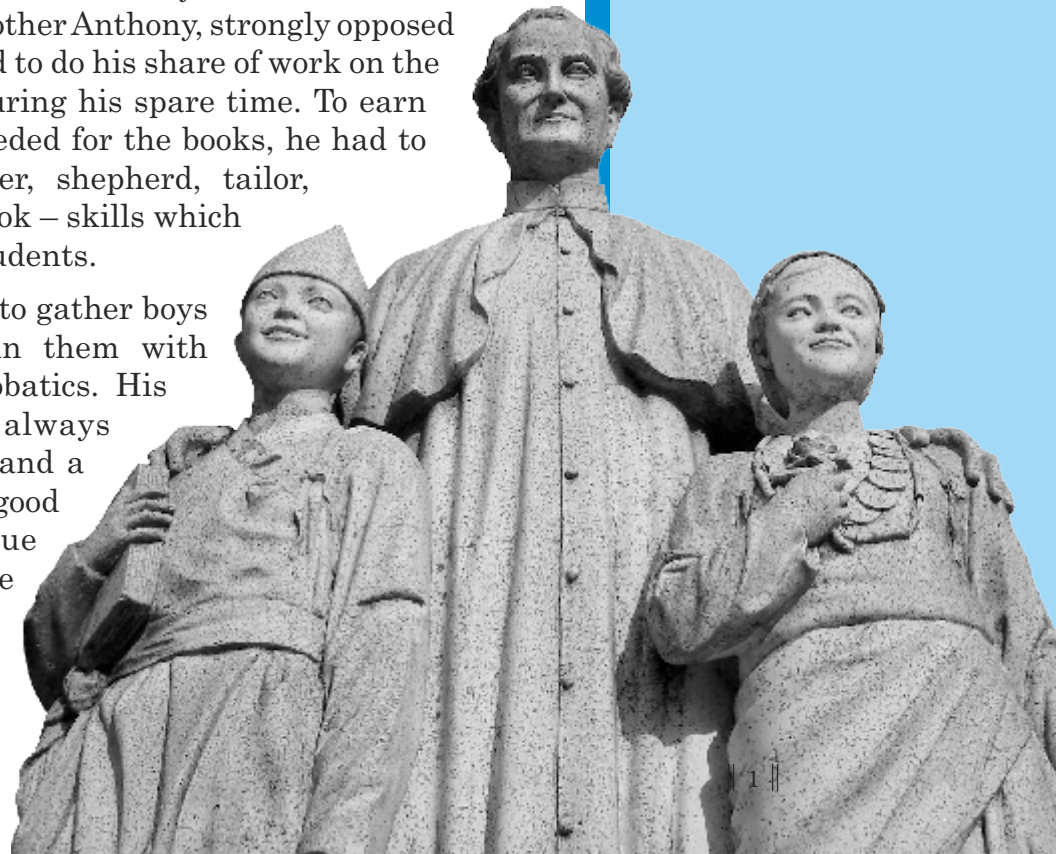
At the age of nine John had a mysterious dream. He saw himself in a vast field, surrounded by youngsters, laughing, singing and playing. Before long the boys began to shout and curse and a fight broke out. John tried to restore order by swinging his fists around and shouting at the trouble makers. A majestic personage stopped him, saying: 'Not with blows, but with gentleness and kindness you shall win them over.'

The Vision

John recognized in this dream his future mission. This experience deepened his desire to become a priest and dedicate his life for the welfare of young people.

John's path however was full of hurdles. His mother, Margaret, though poor, was prepared to make any sacrifice to educate him. But his elder step-brother Anthony, strongly opposed his going to school. He had to do his share of work on the family farm and study during his spare time. To earn the little extra money needed for the books, he had to work often as a labourer, shepherd, tailor, shoemaker, barber and cook – skills which he later taught his poor students.

As a teenager, John used to gather boys of his age and entertain them with magic, jugglery and acrobatics. His performance however, always ended with a good story and a brief exhortation to live a good and honest life. In due course, John entered the seminary and was ordained a priest on 5th



June 1841. From then on he was affectionately known as DON BOSCO (= Father Bosco).

The Mission

In 1853 to train boys in some useful trades, Don Bosco turned his backyard into a makeshift workshop for shoemaking, carpentry, tailoring, smithy, book binding and printing. This was the first Catholic trade school in Italy.

To give permanence to his work, in 1859 he founded a religious Society of Priests and Brothers which was named Salesians, after his favourite saint, Francis de Sales. Today they are known as the Salesians of Don Bosco (SDB).

The Method

Behind the immense success of his work with youth was a unique way of educating the young, a system of education that he developed. He summarized it in three simple words – Reason, Religion and Love.

‘It is not enough to love the young’, he used to tell his helpers, ‘but they must know that you love them.’ To the youngsters he would tell: ‘It is enough that you are young for me to love you.’

The Outcome

Today, a hundred and twenty nine years after Don Bosco’s death, 36,000 Priests, Brothers and Sisters carry out his work in 132 countries around the world. They are engaged in a wide variety of developmental works directed to the welfare of the young: academic, agricultural and technical schools, youth centres, hostels and parishes, catechetics, mass media and social communications, youth counseling and rehabilitation centres and a host of special services for delinquents and marginalized youth.

Don Bosco died on 31 January 1888 at the age of seventy three. He was declared a saint on 1 April 1934. His feast day is celebrated on 31st January every year.

May this great saint always bless all the children and teachers and parents of Don Bosco Higher Secondary School, Mirik.



PROSPECTUS

I. THE PROFILE

Don Bosco Higher Secondary School, Mirik (DBM), Darjeeling, is a West Bengal Government recognized, unaided, minority Christian (Catholic) Co-educational School managed by the Salesians of Don Bosco. It reserves to itself the right to run the school according to its norms and close the school if it is in any way prevented from doing so.

The Don Bosco Higher Secondary School at Mirik was established in the year 1982. In the year 2005 it was recognized as a Junior High School and in 2009 it was upgraded as a High School by the West Bengal Board of Secondary Education. (S/Recog/2009/125). From the year 2017 we have upgraded it to a class XII level with Science & Arts Streams.

The futuristic concept and design, the state of the art facilities, access to all meritorious students and the dedicated faculty synergize to make Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik, a symbol of commitment and quality. The school employs modern and scientific methods of teaching for a more effective learning.

The all-round development of each student is its prime concern. Therefore it not only takes care of their curricular and co-curricular requirements but their cultural, physical, intellectual, spiritual, emotional and psychological needs culminating in a healthy and wholesome Education.

II. OUR VISION

Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik envisages an institution that imparts need-based holistic education to boys and girls to become responsible citizens of their motherland, India. It assists the young people of Mirik to develop themselves intellectually, physically and culturally while encouraging them to grow holistically on totality of body, mind and spirit in virtue and wisdom. It inculcates in them sound principles of self-discipline, efficiency and self-reliance, and prepares them to excel in the West Bengal Board of Secondary Education Madhyamik Examinations & West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education.

III. OUR HALLMARK

Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik offers its young students not only professional qualification but also an integral human education, the possibility of building up his or her life in a mature Christian way and





an opportunity to collaborate in bringing about a more just and human society. It aims at the integral and social growth of a person, by bringing him or her to an encounter with his or her cultural, humanistic and technical heritage. It functions in the light of the Christian concept of life centered on the teachings of Jesus Christ. It attains its goals through the style, spirit and educational method of Don Bosco, The Preventive and Expressive system, based Rapport, Reason and Religion.

IV. OUR SCHOOL EMBLEM

The spirit of Don Bosco Higher Secondary School at Mirik has been encapsulated in its emblem which has four distinct elements.

- a. The Cross with a circle in the middle that signifies its underlying Christian inspiration centered on the philosophy and teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ.
- b. The lamp that symbolizes Virtue in a student's life that should radiate like the rays of light that emanates from its flame. Virtue is that quality which generates in a student moral excellence of character.
- c. The open book and the harp represent Wisdom acquired from curricular and co-curricular activities given their rightful place in school. Wisdom is the ability to think and act with profound discretion, utilizing the knowledge, understanding, insight, common sense and experience attained from education.
- d. The blue mountains and the lush green forests epitomize the panoramic landscape and eco-friendly environment we are blessed with at Mirik to help complete this wholesome education.

V. SCHOOL MANAGEMENT

Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik is owned by the Salesians of Don Bosco Society (Founder Body), with its headquarters on Radhanath Chowdhury Road, Kolkata-15. The president of the School Managing committee is appointed by the Founder Body. The Secretary is the Rector of this institution, also appointed by the Founder Body. The other members of the managing committee are the representatives of parents and teachers and others approved by the Founder Body. Presently we have 25 teachers for 700 students. The student teacher ration is 28:1. We have a set of dedicated and committed teaching and supportive staff who see to the day-to-day smooth running of the school.

VI. GENERAL INFORMATION

a. Aim and Method

Established with the mission to nurture dreams and shape lives, to awaken latent potential and stoke the passion for excellence, Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik opens new horizons for the young people of Mirik. The educational system of the school is founded on the time tested 'Preventive System' of Don Bosco built on the educative pillars of Rapport, Reason and Religion. It is based on conviction, prevention of faults, outlet for expression, paternal correction and the fear of God. The medium of instruction is English. Nepali is the first language. Special care is taken to enhance proficiency in spoken and written English.

b. Religious Instruction

The classes in Christian doctrine (Catechism) are compulsory for the Catholic students. Non-Catholic students must attend Moral Science classes in Value Education which deal with moral principles, life values and rules of good conduct.

c. Discipline/Dismissal from school (T.C.)

Special attention is given to ensure a high standard of morality and discipline in school. Guardians are requested to collaborate in this with the school authorities by ensuring regular attendance, performance of home tasks and punctuality of their wards. Periodical reports in the school diary will keep the parents informed of the progress of their children. These reports are to be countersigned by the parents and returned.



Students are answerable to the school authorities for their conduct in and outside the school. Hence, misbehaviour of any sort justifies dismissal. Irregular attendance, habitual illness or idleness, objectionable moral behaviour, stealing, consumption of alcohol or drugs, smoking, violence, indiscipline, immorality or conduct detrimental to the ordinary life of the school, continual failure to make satisfactory progress in studies and above all discourtesy, disrespect and disobedience to any staff member are each a sufficient cause for dismissal.

d. Vacations

Vacations are clearly laid out in the school calendar. These holidays may not be extended or anticipated. Unauthorized delays and regular absences will result in the removal of the concerned student's name from the school register and may be readmitted at the discretion of the school authorities after having paid the usual

admission fees. Independence Day, Bosco Jayanti, Teachers' Day, Childrens' Day, first day before and last day after long holidays are compulsory attendance days. Fines will be imposed on those who absent themselves on these days.

VII. OFFICE HOURS

The school office hours extend from 9.00 am to 12.00 pm and from 1.30 pm to 2.30 pm. The headmaster can be interviewed between 9.00 am and 11.00 am or by special appointment during office hours.

VIII. COURSES OFFERED



The school follows the WBBSE Syllabus (Classes IX & X) and prepares the students for the Madhyamik Examinations every year in the following Subjects: Nepali and English in the Language group; Mathematics, Physical Science, Life Science in the Science group; History and Geography in the Social Studies group and Work / Physical Education and Environmental Education. Computer Application and General Knowledge are also offered to lower classes. It also prepares the students for the West

Bengal Council for Higher Secondary Education in Science: English, Nepali, Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Maths. Arts: English, Nepali, History, Geography, Political Science and Sociology.

IX. SCHOOL RULES

01. Every student should take care to address the teachers and all the members of the staff with due respect and politeness always. They should be well behaved and courteous towards their companions and all those whom they meet on their way to and from school.
02. Students are responsible for their own belongings. Each article should be marked with the student's name and class.
03. Absence from the school without a leave sanction is not permitted except when the cause is sudden illness or accident. Absence from class must be entered in the school diary with reason written and signed by the Parent/Guardian.
04. Leave of absence is not granted without a previous written application from the Parent/Guardian stating the reason, which must be a serious one. Absence from school to attend birthdays, excursions, festivals, and urgent business or to study at home is never allowed.
05. To enter the classroom the absentees and late comers must show their teacher their regularity record duly countersigned by the Headmaster or Assistant Headmaster. A registered doctor's certificate is needed incase of illnesses that exceed three days.

Failure to produce this may result in the student's being asked to return home during school hours.

06. If any unauthorized absence exceeds fifteen calendar days, the defaulter's name will be struck off the rolls and considered withdrawn.
07. The students' personality, initiative and originality are given full scope in creative co-curricular activities, group works, sports and games; therefore, participation in these is obligatory.
08. If a student fails to pass in all subjects, any concession that he or she may enjoy may be withdrawn or reduced.
09. Any books or magazines or any articles of an objectionable nature like mobile phones, cameras or walkman shall not be brought to the school. If any student is discovered with these above mentioned items, these will be confiscated and a fine imposed on the defaulter at the discretion of the headmaster.
10. Smoking, chewing pan or betel-nut or tobacco, chewing-gum etc. are strictly forbidden in school. Hairstyles not in keeping with normal refinement will not be allowed in school.
11. Any damage to the school property must be made good by the student concerned.
12. During the absence of a teacher from the class, the Monitor and in his or her absence, the Vice-monitor assumes responsibility for the order and discipline in the classroom. Every student speaks only English in the school campus.
13. Students of this school are forbidden to take tuitions from the teachers of Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik. As a rule private tuitions are discouraged as it interferes with the smooth running of the school. Teachers are urged to take extreme care in regard to tuitions for a more efficacious service.
14. No monetary collections of any sort or fines shall be made by anyone in school without the prior permission of the headmaster. Presents to members of the staff or any other incentives to them also require the Headmaster's permission.
15. Parents and guardians are not allowed to see their children or interview teachers during the school hours.
16. No student will be allowed to leave the school during school hours without the proper written permission of the headmaster. Those desirous of going home for lunch may obtain a 'Tiffin Pass' from the headmaster, preceded by a written application from the Parents/Guardians.



17. Students must bring their Tiffin from home and avoid buying food from shops around the school. The school is not responsible for the food sold by the vendors. Eating in the class is a serious breach of discipline and in such cases a student may be penalized.
18. Admission into Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik implies on the part of the students and Parents willingness to comply with all the requirements and regulations of the school. In all matters of promotion, failure or disciplinary action, the decision of the Headmaster is final.

X. ADMISSION AND WITHDRAWAL

19. Admission forms will be available from the school office from last week of October to the second week of November for Classes I-VI and for Class XI (from 1st March). Admission of any candidate is totally at the discretion of the Management that has evolved a system to select the more meritorious students.
20. Parents are asked to fill in the admission forms with the utmost accuracy. No subsequent changes will be permitted for any reason whatsoever. The school does not accept affidavit to change the date of birth already officially entered.
21. Candidates who have attended a recognized school cannot be admitted without a Transfer Certificate from the school he or she last attended. Catholic students must produce their Baptism certificate.
22. New candidates must be introduced personally by the one who will be responsible to the headmaster for their conduct and behaviour. They will be tested in the standard immediately below to which they seek admission.
23. School leaving transfer certificate is issued only after a written application to the headmaster from the Parent/Guardian and after all the dues of the current year (12 months) have been cleared. At least a month's prior notice is to be given before withdrawing a student from the school.
24. If any student fails two years in succession in the same class or twice in three consecutive years, his/her name will be struck off



the rolls and Transfer Certificate will be issued. Students who have some illness that may be contagious or detrimental to the normal school running may be asked to leave the school.

25. As a rule, students who are dismissed from the school are not readmitted. Notwithstanding anything in this prospectus, the Headmaster may at his absolute discretion request any parent at any time to take his ward out of the school.

XI. EXAMINATION & PROMOTION

26. There are two terminal examinations. Each term has two unit tests. Progress reports are given to the students to be shown to the parents and to be countersigned by them.
27. In case a student is absent at these examinations no provision can be made for supplementary tests. Absence in any examination is considered a failure.
28. There is no provision for reexamination or promotion on trial for students who do not pass. The result of the final examinations cannot be altered.
29. The breach of any of the regulations of conduct in the examinations or the use of unfair means, even if discovered subsequently will result in the cancellation of the particular paper and the student concerned will be awarded zero. If such misconduct is repeated, the student will be expelled from the entire examination (all subjects).
30. Promotion at the end of the year will be based on a total continuous assessment in every subject and on the gradual improvement and performance recorded during the year.



XII. SCHOOL FEES

31. The school fees cover twelve calendar months and may be paid in monthly installments or in advance. No reduction is made for holidays or broken periods. Students have to pay full fees for 12 months of the current year as long as their names are officially on the rolls.
32. Fees are to be paid before the 30th of each month failing which a late fee of Rs. 50 will be levied for each month. Pupils whose fees are long overdue may be barred from sitting for the examinations. Fees may be remitted during the office hours at the school counter.



33. Delay in payment may incur the student's dismissal from school. If the delay exceeds two months the candidate is liable to be sent back home without prior notification.
34. Fees for the holiday months must be paid in advance before the school closes. All dues must be paid before the half yearly and final examinations begin.
35. The School reserves the right to increase the fees at any time of the year if an increment is considered necessary.

36. 10% annual increase in the tuition fees is normal.

XIII. SCHOOL UNIFORM

37. Every student must wear correctly a clean and complete uniform daily to school. Whenever the complete uniform cannot be worn, permission to attend the school must be obtained on the regularity record under 'Uniform'. On Fridays however, every student wears the sports vest instead of the school uniform. The School uniform will be as follows:

For Students (Classes I-X):

a. For Boys : White shirt with long sleeves and grey cardigan, worsted grey trousers with school belt, maroon tie with stripes and school badge; plain black leather shoes with grey socks.

b. For Girls : White shirt with long sleeves, worsted grey skirts with 2" side pleats and school belt, grey cardigan, maroon tie with stripes and school badge, plain black leather shoes with grey socks, sky blue ribbon and black slides.

For HS Students:

c. **For Boys** : White shirt with long sleeves and navy blue cardigan, navy blue trousers with school belt, navy blue tie with school emblem, school badge, and coat, plain black leather shoes with blue socks.

d. **For Girls** : White shirt with long sleeves and navy blue cardigan, navy blue skirt with two inch side pleats, school belt, navy blue tie with school emblem, school badge, and coat, plain black leather shoes with blue socks.

XIV. SCHOOL LIBRARY

The School maintains a well-structured and spacious library with over 14000 volumes covering information on Philosophy, Religion, Languages, Biographies, Social Sciences, General Sciences, Computer, Technology, Music and art, Culture, Life and growth, Encyclopaedias, General Knowledge, Sports and Games and a good collection of Newspapers and Magazines. It is also a lending library where from the students and teachers can borrow books of their interest and choice. A full time librarian sees to the order and discipline that is a basic requirement for a good library.



XV. COMPUTER LABS

The well furnished DBM Computer Labs are the most attractive rooms in the School. They have over 80 computers to which the students of Don Bosco have easy access. Computer studies have given the students of Don Bosco an identity and placed the school in the orbit of this computer age. Soon we hope to offer it as a subject at the Madhyamik and Higher Secondary Examinations.



XVI. SCIENCE LABS: PHYSICS/CHEMISTRY/BIOLOGY/MATHS/ HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY

The School has well equipped state of the art laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Maths, History and Geography. This gives the students an opportunity to learn through experiential knowledge, wherein exhibits of various kinds on the concerned subjects are displayed for the better understanding of these subjects.

XVII. VOCAL & INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC



Once a week the students are given training in vocal music and chorus singing. The School has also introduced music classes for students of all classes in Violin, Piano, Rhythm Guitar, Bass Guitar, Keyboard, Drums, Congo and Percussions. Regular practices and training will help them to bring out their hidden talents and display them at school that will further enhance their personality and also prove useful to them in the future. From 2017 we have also introduce Karate for students who want to further discipline themselves and take responsibility for their own safety.

XVIII. SCHOOL CAMPUS

The School has a large campus with well laid out playgrounds, flower gardens and open spaces for greater movement or play. It has been declared the top infrastructural school in North Bengal for the year 2016. Geographical space helps the students to have open and generous minds with a broader outlook to life. It also helps educate them in hygiene and cleanliness.

XIX. SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

The School has a large multipurpose auditorium with a 900 seating capacity, frequently used for various cultural and educative programmes. This opportunity facilitates the development of the students culturally. We provide frequent educative films on the big screen with the help of an LCD projector. Inter school Badminton, Dance, Debate & Quiz competitions are held on regular basis.

XX. PRAYER ROOM

The school has a interreligious prayer room where the students can learn to pray and to meditate and thus become aware of the need of the constant presence and assistance of the Divine in their lives. It also instils in them respect and tolerance for all religions.

XXI. SMART CLASS

The school has three well-furnished and fully equipped digital classrooms and audiovisual rooms where the students get an opportunity for the visual learning of their various subjects prescribed in the syllabus for classes I-XII.

XXII. SPORTS AND GAMES

Sports and Games are an integral part of a wholesome education. Opportunities are provided to the students for various indoor and outdoor games. We have a mini Football & Cricket court, a Badminton court, a Basketball court, a Volleyball court and an open space for other outdoor games. We provide the students with indoor games facilities like Carroms, Chess, Draughts, and Chinese checkers etc. Biennial Sports Day gives opportunity to the students to take part in various athletic events and get trained in March past and drill display. At least a period a week is set apart for physical training. The well setup children's park is the most enjoyable place in school, especially for primary students. These children-friendly equipments are great source of relaxation for our young students.

XXIII. GROUPS AND MOVEMENTS

Working in groups is one of the best ways to train up leadership qualities in the students. We have the Scouts and Guides, Cubs & Bulbuls, Leadership Training Service, the Nature club, the Quiz club, the Badminton Club, Basketball Club, Literary Club etc. and the House system that helps the students to bring out their qualities of mind and heart to the full.



XXIV. SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Don Bosco Higher Secondary School Mirik has its contribution to make to the building up of a more just and human society. This it does not only by forming individual persons but also by sharing in the life of its neighborhood and by facing up to the educational and cultural problems in society. Therefore, it reaches out to the less fortunate young people of the Mirik valley by making education a reality for the many who are economically marginalized. Although it is not a Government aided school, this institution endeavours to bring good quality education at a very affordable price. The ten well-selected member student council help in the smooth running of the school fully collaborating with the school co-ordinator and teachers.

XXV. CAREER GUIDANCE/COUNSELLING

From time to time professionals and experts in the field of career guidance and child counseling are invited to give inputs in education to growth and love. The students of Class XI & XII are trained to face competitive exams for various entrance examinations every 6 months. This prepares the students to face the future with greater confidence and courage.

XXVI. CELEBRATIONS

Various celebrations throughout the year have their own impact on the students. The Independence Day and the Republic Day celebrations are held to inculcate in the students the spirit of patriotism and love for the country. Bosco Jayanti reminds the students of St. John Bosco, the patron of the school and the values he most cherished. Parents Day celebration bring out the talents of the students as well as an opportunity to display their gratitude to their parents. Teachers' day celebration builds in the students respect for their teachers. The Children's Day celebration encourages every student to strive for all round excellence.

XXVII. PRIZES AND AWARDS

The students of the school are divided into four Houses – Red, Blue, Green and Yellow. All curricular and co-curricular activities are awarded points throughout the year to encourage healthy competition. Meritorious students are awarded individual prizes as recognition of their efforts and as incentives for betterment and further striving for excellence.



XXVIII. PARENT-TEACHER MEETINGS

Parents are invited to the school 5 times during the course of the scholastic year. In the beginning of the Scholastic year the parents of the students are called to be briefed on the plans for the students in the year ahead. After the second Unit Test they are called again to meet the class teachers and subject teachers to discuss about the progress made by their wards. When the results of the Half Yearly examinations are declared they are called yet again to assess the results of the Terminal examination. In the month of August the parents of Classes VIII-XII students are called for a special meeting to decide ways to help the students to prepare for the Madhyamik and Higher Secondary Examination. The parents are invited on a day in the year wherein the students show them their gratitude and love. After the fourth Unit test all the parents are called for the last time to apprise them on the progress made by their wards in the past year.

XXIX. ALL ROUND DEVELOPMENT

All the activities of the school fall into categories that help build up the young minds.

- a) **Curricular** : Systematic teaching of the content of the syllabus, Home works and class tests given on a regular basis, 4 unit tests through the year & 2 Terminal Examinations. Continuous evaluation and feedback to the students together with their parents.
- b) **Co-curricular** : House wise activities – Elocution & Speech competitions, Singing and Dance competitions, Spelling Contest (Spellbound) Science & Geography Exhibitions, Fancy dress competitions, story telling competitions etc. Groups and movements that encourage healthy growth – Scouts and Guides, The LTS, The Nature club, Basket Ball club, Quiz Club etc.
- c) **Cultural** : Interschool cultural & sporting competitions, Lessons in Vocal and Instrumental music, Lessons in Classical & Modern Dance, Drama competitions, Painting & Drawing contests, Stage performances, Reading materials on various local cultures etc
- d) **Physical** : Yoga, Karate, Sports and games, Athletics, Basketball, Football, Volleyball, Cricket Badminton, etc., Indoor games, healthy and hygienic life, good manners & First Aid. Wholesome midday meal provided at the school canteen keeps our students



healthy and fit.

- e) **Intellectual** : Weekly Quiz competitions, Essay writing competitions, Debates, School magazine, Reading and writing articles for display boards, reading of newspapers etc.
- f) **Spiritual** : Daily morning talks at the assembly, prayer services for the country and its leaders, class-wise prayer experience, prayer for victims of calamities, Value Education, friendly corrections etc.
- g) **Emotional** : Healthy interactive programmes for boys and girls, Education to life and growth, leadership training and orientation programmes, one-to-one follow up.
- h) **Psychological** : Prizes and awards that reinforce greater effort, Counseling to academically weak or problematic students, family visit and keeping constant touch with the parents etc.

XXX. NOTE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

- a. Parents retain their rights and duties in the education of their children, even though they delegate them in part to the school. The support and collaboration of parents always is considered indispensable for the success of the work of education carried out by the school.
- b. Parents and guardians are requested to co-operate with the school authorities by
 - i. Urging their children to be regular and punctual in attendance.
 - ii. Not engaging private tutors without consulting the school



authorities.

- iii. Seeing that their children are diligent at their homework and lessons.
- iv. Insisting on neatness and cleanliness in their text books, exercise books, dress and personal appearance.
- v. Occasionally interviewing the Headmaster to discuss the progress of their children.
- c. School is not responsible for any misbehaviour or tragedy that happens outside the school or in the school after school hours. Parents must keep a watchful eye on their children on the way to and from school.
- d. Periodical reports and report cards will keep parents informed of the progress of their children. These reports are to be duly signed by the parent and returned to the school. Unauthorised signatories have no right to sign on the diary.
- e. Communications with the parents or guardians are made through the School Diary. All communications to the school should be addressed only to the Headmaster.
- f. Any parent bringing unauthorised persons to school to register a complaint or misbehave with or disrespect any staff member will be treated as a serious fault and will have to bear the consequence of the dismissal of their ward.
- g. If the guardian of a student is called for by the Headmaster and the guardian fails to turn up, the student may not be allowed to sit in the Class till the guardian meets the Headmaster.
